
NTSS TURNS 55









New Town Secondary School was founded in 1965, the same year Singapore gained independence. It started its operation in the Queenstown estate which was the first satellite town built in Singapore and hence the school was named New Town Secondary School (NTSS). By 1975, NTSS was the largest school with both Chinese and English streams and more than 3540 students. As a result, there were many prominent alumni from NTSS and many have returned to serve the school in the Alumni, School Advisory Committee and as inspirational speakers.

Guided by the philosophy, 'Students Our Core', sustained efforts have been made by the school in enabling students to uncover their strengths and develop their talents through a holistic curriculum. An array of programmes and activities have been provided to every Newtowner for their development under the cognitive, aesthetic, moral, physical and social domains. In 2015, the Ministry of Education (MOE) accorded the first niche programme status to the school in student leadership development under the Learning for Life Programme. In 2016, a second niche status was conferred by MOE to NTSS for equipping students with critical and inventive thinking skills through visual communication under the Applied Learning Programme.

In 2017, under the Special Talent Programme, the school's niche in developing talents and enhancing experiences in Art was recognised by MOE and NTSS is amongst the few schools in Singapore offering the Enhanced Art Programme.

Even as New Town Secondary marked its 55th year in the face of COVID-19, the support, solidarity and positivity manifested by our staff, students, parents and key stakeholders were encouraging. The school's vision of 'Nurturing Talents, Sharing Success' and motto, 'To Forge a Better Life' will always be upheld by the school community as it goes 55 and beyond.



Class-Based Activities with Form Teachers

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, Newtowners would usually begin their Wednesday morning either in the hall for an assembly programme or in their classrooms for the Form Teacher Period (FTP). FTP is a dedicated time for students to bond with their classmates and their Form Teachers (FTs) through structured activities planned by the school, FTs or class committees.

With the COVID-19 safety measures restricting mass gatherings in school, all assembly programmes were adapted to be conducted in class. These included commemorative events such as Racial Harmony Day and National Day, as well as programmes for Kindness Day SG and Anti-Drug Abuse Campaign (ADAC). Students folded ribbons in support of ADAC and pledged their stand against drug abuse. When school reopened in Term Three, students also spent time discussing and reflecting on their Full Home-Based Learning (FHBL) experiences. All these were captured in the form of heartfelt written reflections, drawings and even photographs, which were eventually put together in a unique video titled 'The NTSS-FHBL Experience'.

FTP is also used as a platform to discuss issues close to the hearts of our students. These include tips on how to manage their well-being leading up to examinations and learning how to tackle cyber wellness issues such as building their online identities and understanding scams and hackers. During a special class-based activity titled 'Gearing Up for Examinations', students had the opportunity to watch an interview, where some of the teachers shared useful study tips and strategies. Following this, the students wrote messages to motivate themselves. This activity was well-received by the students with some even pasting their personal messages on their desks in the classrooms.






#SYFstrongerTogether Project: Towards a Stronger Singapore





Maintaining strength and flexibility through stretching

In June 2020, our school commenced an alternative mode of CCA via digital means (eCCA) to bring back a key learning experience for students. Similar to Home-Based Learning, a combination of online and offline activities were conducted during eCCA sessions to provide students with meaningful learning experiences while they were at home.

Sports and Games CCAs took a different approach in continuing to equip students with knowledge about games by engaging in discussions on sports theory and video analysis of game plays. At the same time, physical training took the form of creative workout routines and skills drills that could be easily done at home. The Uniformed Groups employed various strategies such as the use of online platforms, hands-on activities and live demonstrations or pre-recorded videos to engage the students. Senior cadets were also given the opportunity to lead their juniors in online activities and discussions. The Performing Arts students continued to learn and practise new choreography and music pieces under the guidance of their instructors and teachers. The Visual Art as well as Clubs and Societies ignited creativity in students' work and generated conversations through the use of themes and current affairs such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

The teachers, coaches and instructors all played a great part in innovating and creating engaging eCCA sessions for our students.

PE in School and through FHBL

At home or in school, quality Physical Education (PE) remains key to the holistic development of every child. Our PE department aims to develop physically active and healthy individuals who are thinking players of good character.

During the Full Home-Based Learning (FHBL), students continued effective learning in four areas: (i) Sports Module (ii) Physical Health and Fitness Theory (iii) Character Education (iv) 30-minute Workout Sessions.

To encourage students through FHBL and the circuit breaker, the PE Department launched the New Town PE Paperball Class Challenge in April to inspire social connectedness and unity despite the physical distancing. In addition, the PE Ergonomics CARE Package was customised to empower students to adopt good posture to improve productivity.

Returning to school for face-to-face PE lessons was re-energizing for our students. Adopting new safety measures as part of our new norms for PE lessons, students practised physical distancing and followed a clean routine for a safe learning environment. Individual and pair workout lessons were carried out with the use of music, gamification, visuals and in-depth training for motivation and engagement.

New Town Kindness Day (NTKD) 2020 is a new programme led by our Peer Support Leaders (PSLs) as an initiative to spread positivity and kindness while inspiring others to care for one another and challenge for change. Launched in June 2020, our PSLs were trained to lead their classes during the Form Teacher Period.

In light of our theme for this year, 'Make Someone Smile Today', our PSLs brainstormed to create a meaningful experience for both our staff and students. The programme began with students viewing an original music video production titled 'Starting With You'. This song was directed, sung and produced by our PSLs to encourage the heart of others; sharing that kindness begins with YOU. Newtowners then learnt how to fold an origami paper crane, before deciding on their preferred choice of gifting (drawing, digital drawing, origami folding). Finally, our PSLs launched a '7 Days of Kindness' programme within their own classes, where PSL-designed 'Appreciation, Motivation and Action' e-cards were sent out daily to serve as a reminder to care and begin the day with a smile.


Racial Harmony Day – Multicultural Singapore

At three different sites in our school, Geography teachers guided students to use various fieldwork tools to collect data on weather elements, including sling psychrometers to measure relative humidity and our self-created observation templates to measure the extent of cloud cover.

This year, our students embarked on various language programmes and discovered their interests in learning MTL when they participated in engaging performance tasks and activities. In the process, students acquired new knowledge and skills which helped to enhance their language proficiencies.

Even during the challenging Full Home-Based Learning period, both teachers and students showed extraordinary resilience and active learning was kept alive with the use of e-pedagogies. Our Senior Teacher/ML, Mdm Kasumawati, was quick to spring into action and created a Malay Language (ML) Google site as a one-stop resource repository for Upper Secondary ML students. Besides providing the ease of access to resources, the site also allowed students to carry out self-directed learning.

During the Full Home-Based Learning in April, besides adopting video conferencing platforms such as Zoom to teach students, teachers utilised the Mathematics resources in Student Learning Space (SLS) to conduct asynchronous learning. These resources, which were partly developed by Master Teachers, aided students in understanding the mathematical concepts they were learning.

Teachers revisited and revamped some teaching resources to provide students with appropriate learning experiences that would help them understand the concepts taught. Hands-on lessons on Pythagoras' Theorem and the use of real-life examples to understand Gradients have enhanced students' engagement.

Full Home-Based Learning (FHBL) did not stop our students from learning through collaboration. Teachers adopted the idea of 'expert groups' in which students first performed independent research on a topic using Google Classroom. Subsequently, students shared their research findings with their peers through video conferencing under the guidance of their Science teachers.

Using the online application Classkick, students were able to make their thinking visible through drawings and writing of chemical equations on an online whiteboard. Science teachers also used Classkick to provide timely feedback on students' work.

During FHBL, the science teachers continued to encourage learning through inquiry by encouraging students to carry out simple and fun experiments at home. The Chemistry students investigated the changes in the colour of the red cabbage indicator in common household items and reported their findings using ICT tools.

Scaling up practical skills and competencies

The Secondary Four and Five Science students had the opportunity to go back to the Science laboratories to brush up on their practical skills and competencies when school reopened at the end of the circuit breaker period. Safe-distancing measures were implemented in the laboratories and students were also given additional practical sessions.

Students were eager to get back to the laboratories to learn titration techniques in Chemistry, experiment with electrical circuits in Physics and conduct food testing in Biology. Overall, our students enjoyed the practical sessions and were thankful to have the opportunity to revisit the practical skills in school.


Embracing the challenges of virtual collaborative learning, students learnt to use Google Slides as they collaborated to create their oral presentations and shared them live during Zoom sessions. Such virtual platforms have enabled students to be self-directed learners and effective communicators.

Applied Learning Programme

Our Secondary One students went through a seven-week photography module during Art lessons as part of the school's Applied Learning Programme. We adopted a blended approach to learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The module focussed mainly on art discussions, exploration of angles and composition, and telling a story using digital tools such as the mobile phones and iPads.

Students had the chance to discuss works by local photographers and present their ideas during classroom sessions, while they practised and applied the skills during Full Home-Based Learning.

Enhanced Art Programme

Our Secondary Three Enhanced Art Programme (EAP) students had the opportunity to work with the artist mentor of their choice over a two-hour workshop at LASALLE. Through this programme, the EAP students acquired basic knowledge, skills and attributes as they worked with their peers and industry practitioners. This experience complemented the students' learning in the classroom and served as a prelude to their participation in I-LEAP in November this year.

Our Secondary Three EAP students had the privilege to meet and learn from local artist-duo Liquan Liew and Estella Ng on 1st September 2020. They learnt about creative processes and how bold colours, rhythmic strokes and patterns are applied to depict scenes and

The collaborative nature of the artists' creative processes also sparked curiosity and interest among our students who were seen swapping their artworks and providing constructive inputs to their peers. This helped to build a collection of works that was original and spontaneous.

Besides learning from the artists, our EAP students collaborated with them to come up with the design for our school's student handbook. Their collaborative work will be reflected on the cover of the handbook for 2021.






Long Service Medal
